Course Description

Methods of Instruction

Teachers enrolled in this course will evaluate primary and secondary sources. They will communicate with other teachers around the state and country to share success stories and gain insights into best practices in instruction. They will complete assignments that assess their understanding of the assigned readings. They will also complete lesson plans to assess application of the material.

Students will connect with each other throughout the course within forums and various other types of online feedback options built into each class.

Methods of Assessment

In order to earn an A in class, a student must complete all of the assigned readings and assignments, participate in all discussion forums, compete <u>all</u> assigned tasks and compete <u>two</u> one graduate level paper and three lesson plans.

In order to earn an B in class, a student must complete all of the assigned readings and assignments, participate in all discussion forums, and compete <u>all</u> assigned tasks.

Instructors are online each day of the course and correspond with students through the course itself, feedback on assignments, e-mail and by phone.

Assignment #1: What are Study Skills? Assignment #1 is a written assignment designed to obtain the students' base knowledge of teaching study skills.	1.00
Assignment #2: Study Skills Assessment - Readings, inventory and checklist. The students will participate in readings about study skills, complete an inventory and checklist to determine their learning style, and complete a written assignment reflecting on their learning style and how it influences their teaching.	3.00
Assignment #3: Interview - The students will complete study skill interviews (questions are provided). One interview with a student and one with a parent. The students will summarize these interviews upon completion of questions asked.	2.00
Assignment #4: Good Study Habits/Environments versus Bad Study Habits/Environments - The students will use the previous interviews conducted, readings, and the grade level of their students to create a study skills tip sheet to be used in their classrooms.	2.00
Assignment #5: Graphic Organizers – The students will use previous readings and websites, to find age appropriate graphic organizers to use with their students and provide a written response (a lesson plan) of how to use the graphic organizer/activity sheets with their students.	2.00
Assignment #6: Context Clues Quiz – Quiz covering all material covered in course thus far – students may refer to previous readings to assist them in answering questions.	2.00
Assignment #7: Prefix vs. Suffix - After completion of reading, complete prefix vs. suffix worksheet. Create one to use age appropriate with your students.	3.50
Assignment #8: Tips for Reading - After completion of three reading assignments, create a "Tips for Reading" sheet appropriate for your students	2.50
Assignment #9: Note-Taking lesson Plan – This assignment incorporates five readings, graphic organizers, thinking maps, and free note taking worksheets. The students will prepare a note-taking lesson plan incorporating some of the resources above.	4.00
Assignment #10: Studying and Memorization – Readings regarding memorization techniques. Students will complete a memory device worksheet using acronyms, acrostic, rhymes, grouping techniques, imagery and visualization, and external memory devices.	4.00
Assignment #11: Activity and Games Forum – Whole class sharing and explanation of activities, games, etc. used in their classroom. Students are required to share and respond to one another over multiple days.	3.00
Assignment #12: Test Taking Tips Sheet – After completing readings about test taking strategies, create a testing taking tips sheet appropriate for your students.	3.00
Assignment #13: Website Readings and Graphic Organizer Paper – Researching graphic organizers and creating a writing lesson plan appropriate for your students using the graphic organizer(s) you chose.	3.00
